A Northern Exploration of Wine, Dairy, and Fruit Research

This tour will depart north to three stops that offer a blend of agriculture, craft beverages, and innovation.

Country Dairy is a fourth-generation fairy farm that has become an agro-tourism and educational destination. Their farm milks 1200 cows and bottles 70,000 gallons of milk per week. They sell their milk, cheese, butter and ice cream in their retail store and restaurant and employ 125 people.

Fox Barn Winery has been a part of the farming community for five generations. The business' foundation is the care of the 2000 acres of land that is 75 percent fruit with the remaining land growing asparagus and wood lots managed by a forester. The Farm Market was introduced in 2005 and the Winery added in 2008.

West Michigan Research Station is a community-based, non-profit research station dedicated to agricultural research for the neighboring communities of Oceana, Newaygo, and Mason Communities. Situated on 86 acres of farmland, the station partners with stakeholder groups and provides support to farmers with training, research, community space, and equipment.

At **Critter Barn** there is an elite hands-on agricultural education center with real farm experience. Engage with a variety of farm animals and learn about roles in agriculture. Through interactive exhibits and guided talks, you'll gain insights into Critter Barn's inspirational practices.

St. Steve's Farm-Crafted Beverages is where the art of farm-crafted beverages comes to life. Here, you can learn about the selection of hand-crafted sodas, sparkling waters, cordials and teas made locally from their farm and the production process of St. Steve's Farm-Crafted Beverages.

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Working Farms Double as Agricultural Classrooms

Join us for an afternoon exploring two unique stops that celebrate agricultural heritage, modernization, and consumer experience.

Robinette's Apple Haus and Winery, which started in 1911 as a peach farm, is now a sixth-generation, year-round agrotourism staple right outside of Grand Rapids. Learn more about their retail-marketing, apple production, and innovative direct-to-consumer strategies.

Dairy Discovery is a non-profit educational organization that helps tell the story of modern dairy farming through programs, tours, and camps, as well as hosting educational open houses events. Dairy Discovery was founded by Annie Link of **Swisslane Farms**, after many years of welcoming classrooms on their farm to learn where their food comes from.

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Barn Quilt Making & Coopersville Farm Museum

At **Coopersville Farm Museum** you have the chance to not only learn about techniques behind creating your own barn quilt, but the historical and now direct-to-consumer significance of barn quilts to Michigan.

Each participant will paint and take home their own 2 ft. by 2 ft. wooden barn quilt.

While you wait for your barn quilt to dry, explore the Coopersville Farm Museum, a non-profit organization dedicated to honoring farming and rural life! This experience brings you an enjoyable time and the souvenir of your very own barn or wood quilt!

There will be a \$40 fee for each participant to cover the barn quilt making supplies and class.
